

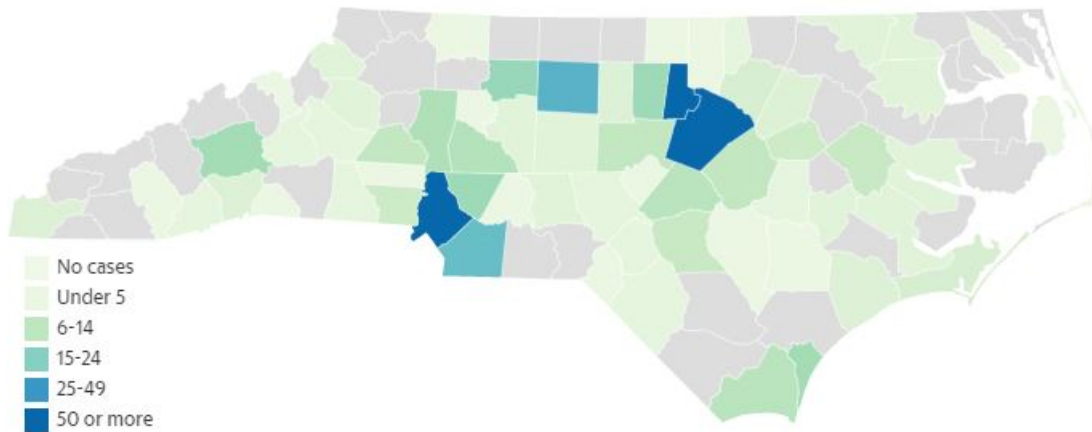


**Pender County Situation Report #16

<b>7. Current Situation:</b>			
<p><b>EOC IS OPERATING AT A LEVEL 3 STATUS:</b> Level 3 is a hazard specific response to an incident. This incident requires the assistance of several State agencies. The Emergency Operations Center is activated but only staffed with essential personnel. The EOC is not operating on 24-hour shifts. The EOC is only functioning during standard business hours.</p>			
<b>GOVERNOR COOPER EXECUTIVE ORDERS (EOs)</b>			
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• <b>EO 117 (March 14, 2020):</b> Limited mass gatherings to 100 persons and closed K-12 public schools.</li> <li>• <b>EO 118 (March 17, 2020):</b> Limited operations of restaurants/bars and broadened unemployment benefits.</li> <li>• <b>EO 119 (March 21, 2020):</b> Facilitated critical motor vehicle regulations, waived regulations to expand access to childcare, and support local health departments.</li> <li>• <b>EO 120 (March 23, 2020):</b> Reduced the mass gathering limit to 50 persons, extended public school closers until at least May 15, 2020, limited long term care visitations, closed entertainment and other service facilities, and provided direction to local governments regarding service delivery as well as employee safety.</li> </ul>			
NC DHHS made statewide recommendations to minimize the spread of COVID-19:			
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• high risk people (those over 65, with underlying health conditions, or with compromised immune systems) should avoid large congregations.</li> <li>• Sick people should not attend mass gathering events, and travelers returning from impacted areas should follow <a href="#">these DHHS steps</a>.</li> <li>• NC DHHS has set up a help line for COVID-19 related inquiries; 866-462-3821.</li> </ul>

**13. Incident Area:** As of today (3/27), the Pender County Health Department is aware of a total of thirty-seven (37) COVID-19 tests that have been completed within the County. This includes Pender Memorial Hospital, Pender County Health Department, and other healthcare providers. Of those tests, twenty-two (22) were confirmed negative, while fifteen (15) tests are currently pending final results. There have been no confirmed positive tests.

**14. External Affairs:** Pender County remains in monitoring mode. The Public Information Officer and the communications team are monitoring the County’s social media platforms and updating the County’s website with accurate information.

**15. County Action:**

- 911 Dispatch Center did not receive any COVID-19 related calls in the last 24-hour operating period.
- Pender County School System is feeding students and anyone 18 or younger at 62 sites around the county, with specific information [available here](#). On Tuesday, the schools provided 8,848 meals for lunch and breakfast. Total meals served through Wednesday breakfast has reached 24,034.
- Pender County Schools is providing wi-fi hotspots for school-issued devices from 7 AM to 7 PM seven days a week at Pender High, Topsail High, and Heide Trask High. There is also a public wi-fi access point in the parking lot of the Pender County Public Library in Burgaw.

**16. Other Notes, Issues or Additional Remarks:** Pursuant to EO 117 issued March 14, 2020, all persons are urged to maintain social distancing (approximately six feet away from other people) whenever possible and to continue to wash hands, utilize hand sanitizer and practice proper respiratory etiquette (including coughing into elbow).
