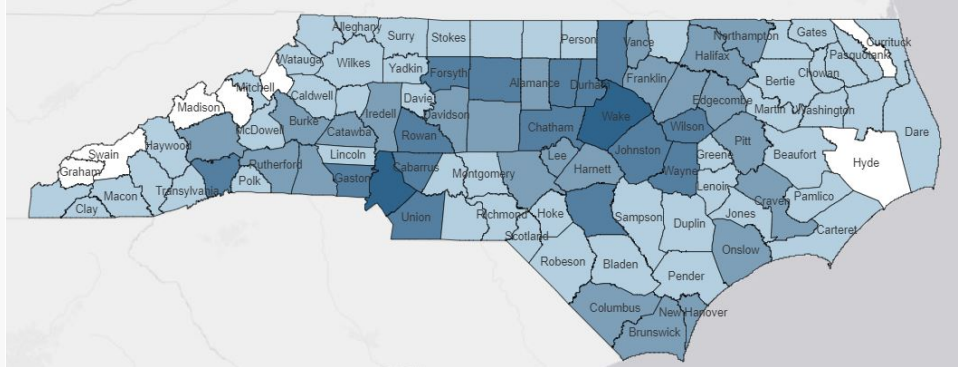
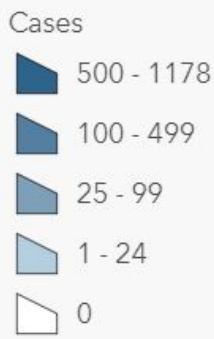




**Pender County Situation Report #39 - COVID-19 Event
April 19, 2020 - The County is operating at EOC Status Level 3.**

<p>7. Current Situation: EOC IS OPERATING AT A LEVEL 3 STATUS. Level 3 is a hazard specific response to an incident. This incident requires the assistance of several State agencies. The Emergency Operations Center is activated but only staffed with essential personnel. The EOC is not operating on 24-hour shifts. The EOC is only functioning during standard business hours, with minimal weekend staffing.</p> <p>Weather: Today: A slight chance of showers, then a chance of showers and thunderstorms after 3pm. Mostly cloudy, with a high near 75. South wind around 11 mph, with gusts as high as 18 mph. Chance of precipitation is 30%. New rainfall amounts between a tenth and quarter of an inch, except higher amounts possible in thunderstorms. Tonight: A chance of showers and thunderstorms, then showers and possibly a thunderstorm after 9pm. Low around 62. Southwest wind around 7 mph. Chance of precipitation is 80%. New rainfall amounts between a half and three quarters of an inch possible. Tomorrow: Showers and possibly a thunderstorm before 1pm, then a chance of showers and thunderstorms, mainly between 1pm and 5pm. High near 70. Southwest wind 9 to 16 mph becoming north in the afternoon. Winds could gust as high as 26 mph. Chance of precipitation is 80%. New rainfall amounts between three quarters and one inch possible. Severe thunderstorms likely tonight and early Monday. Periods of heavy rain, may cause excessive water locally at times, tonight and Monday morning.</p> <p>Fire Weather: RP-3: A dangerous storm system will impact the area late today through Monday morning, as several waves of strong to severe thunderstorms track across the coast, especially late tonight and early on Monday. This system will clear the area late Monday with a drying trend to follow, and cooler temperatures into mid week. A cold front will cross the coast late Thursday and early Friday. Wind profile analysis/fire control over flat terrain is Favorable. Fog potential for tonight is Low.</p> <p>GOVERNOR COOPER EXECUTIVE ORDERS (EOs)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> EOs 117, 118, 119, 120, 121, 122, and 124 remain in effect except as superseded by subsequent orders. Details here. EO 125 (April 1, 2020): Authorized and encouraged remote shareholder meetings during the State of Emergency. EO 129 (April 7, 2020): Provided flexibility regarding certain law enforcement training courses. EO 130 (April 8, 2020): Provided more access to health care beds, expanded the pool of health care workers and ordered essential childcare services for workers responding to the crisis. EO 131 (April 9, 2020): Required retail stores that are still operating to implement new social distancing policies to make shopping safer for customers and employees; made earlier COVID-19 guidelines mandatory for nursing facilities, and recommended other long-term care facilities do the same; sped up the process to get benefits to people out of work <p>The public can subscribe to text updates from NC DHHS regarding COVID-19 by texting COVIDNC to 898211. 11. Incident Area: As of Friday (4/17), the Pender County Health Department is aware of a total of one hundred and twenty-eight (128) residents of Pender County who have been tested for COVID-19 by healthcare providers within the county. Of those tests, four (4) were confirmed positive, one hundred and twelve (112) were confirmed negative, while twelve (12) tests are currently pending. As many providers are closed over the weekend, updated local testing numbers will next be available on Monday (4/20). **There have been four (4) additional confirmed positive tests of Pender County residents performed by healthcare providers outside the county for a total of eight (8) Pender County residents who have tested positive for COVID-19, five (5) of whom have recovered.**

To respect patient privacy and comply with federal law, more specific information about these cases is not available. Every surrounding county has confirmed cases of COVID-19, so all Pender County residents should assume they are capable of getting or spreading the virus and take recommended precautions accordingly.

12. External Affairs: Pender County remains in monitoring mode. The Public Information Officer and the communications team are monitoring the County's social media platforms and updating the County's website with accurate information.

13. County Action:

- Pender County School System is feeding students and anyone 18 or younger at 56 sites, details [available here](#). Due to the closure of Beatty's Bridge Rd across the county line, the Yonder Store drop location will change to Shaky Bay Blueberry Farm (4676 Beatty's Bridge Rd) at the same stop time starting Monday (4/13).
- Pender County Schools is providing wi-fi hotspots for school-issued devices from 7 AM to 7 PM seven days a week at Pender High, Topsail High, Heide Trask High, and West Pender Middle. There is also a public wi-fi access point in the parking lot of the Pender County Public Library in Burgaw.
- Pender County Government is strongly encouraging appointments for in-person visits, information [available here](#). In accordance with the governor's order that teleworking be practiced to the maximum extent possible, many staff members began teleworking starting Tuesday, March 31.
- Pender County Board of Commissioners Chairman George Brown declared a State of Emergency effective Monday, March 30, 2020.

14. Other Notes, Issues or Additional Remarks: Pursuant to EO 117 issued March 14, 2020, all persons are urged to maintain social distancing (approximately six feet away from other people) whenever possible and to continue to wash hands, utilize hand sanitizer and practice proper respiratory etiquette (including coughing into elbow).

CDC recommends wearing cloth face coverings in public settings where other social distancing measures are difficult to maintain (e.g., grocery stores and pharmacies) **especially** in areas of significant community-based transmission.
