7. Current Situation: EOC IS OPERATING AT A LEVEL 3 STATUS. Level 3 is a hazard specific response to an incident. This incident requires the assistance of several State agencies. The Emergency Operations Center is activated but only staffed with essential personnel. The EOC is not operating on 24-hour shifts. The EOC is only functioning during standard business hours, with minimal weekend staffing.

Weather: Today: Sunny, with a high near 72. Northwest wind around 15 mph, with gusts as high as 23 mph.

Tonight: Clear, with a low around 44. Northwest wind around 5 mph becoming calm in the evening.

Tomorrow: Sunny, with a high near 76. Calm wind becoming southwest 5 to 8 mph in the afternoon. Winds could gust as high as

No hazardous weather is expected at this time.


Fire Weather: RP-4: High pressure will build in from the west through this afternoon, bringing dry weather and near normal temps through Wed. The next cold front, accompanied with showers and thunderstorms, will push across the area late Wed night and off the Carolina coasts and offshore Thu morning. Dry high pressure with near normal temperatures, will build across the region late Thu thru Sat. A warming trend will occur on Sun as the high drops southeast of the area. Wind profile analysis/fire control over flat terrain is Favorable. Fog potential for tonight is Low.

GOVERNOR COOPER EXECUTIVE ORDERS (EOs)

- EOs 117, 118, 119, 120, 121, 122, 124, 125, and 129 remain in effect except as superseded by subsequent orders. Details here.
- EO 130 (April 8, 2020): Provided more access to health care beds, expanded the pool of health care workers and ordered essential childcare services for workers responding to the crisis.
- EO 131 (April 9, 2020): Required retail stores that are still operating to implement new social distancing policies to make shopping safer for customers and employees; made earlier COVID-19 guidelines mandatory for nursing facilities, and recommended other long-term care facilities do the same; sped up the process to get benefits to people out of work.
- EO 133 (April 20, 2020): Extended certain transportation-related provisions in previous executive orders.
- EO 134 (April 20, 2020): Allowed businesses flexibility to make payments that assist their employees.
- EO 135 (April 23, 2020): Extended stay at home order and orders limiting mass gatherings, requiring social distancing, and restricting visitation at long term care facilities.
- At a press conference on 4/24, Gov. Cooper announced that remote learning will continue for the remainder of the 2019-2020 academic year.

9. Incident Area: As of today (4/27), the Pender County Health Department is aware of a total of eleven (11) Pender County residents who have tested positive for COVID-19. Of the positive cases, four (4) are offenders at Pender Correctional, six (6) are in the community, and one (1) is out of state. Five (5) of the individuals who have tested positive have recovered, while one (1) is deceased.

NOTE: The COVID-19 test results provided on 4/25 to NC DHHS by Vidant Health incorrectly reported test results as all being positive. This resulted in an inaccurate report of one (1) additional case in Pender County. That error has been corrected in this report as of 4/26.

The Pender County Health Department is aware of one hundred and eighty-one (181) residents of Pender County tested for COVID-19 by healthcare providers within the county. Of those tests, eight (8) were confirmed positive, one hundred and seventy-one (171) were confirmed negative, while two (2) tests are currently pending. There have been three (3) additional confirmed positive tests of Pender County residents performed by healthcare providers outside the county.

To respect patient privacy and comply with federal law, more specific information about these cases is not available. Every surrounding county has confirmed cases of COVID-19, so all Pender County residents should assume they are capable of getting or spreading the virus and take recommended precautions accordingly.

10. External Affairs: Pender County remains in monitoring mode. The Public Information Officer and the communications team are monitoring the County's social media platforms and updating the County's website with accurate information.

11. County Action:

- Pender County School System is feeding students and anyone 18 or younger at 56 sites, details available here.
- Pender County Schools is providing wi-fi hotspots for school-issued devices from 7 AM to 7 PM seven days a week at Pender High, Topsail High, Heide Trask High, and West Pender Middle. There is also a public wi-fi access point in the parking lot of the Pender County Public Library in Burgaw.
- Pender County Government is strongly encouraging appointments for in-person visits, information <u>available here</u>. In accordance with the governor's order that teleworking be practiced to the maximum extent possible, many staff members began teleworking starting Tuesday, March 31.
- Pender County Board of Commissioners Chairman George Brown declared a State of Emergency effective Monday, March 30, 2020.
- **12. Other Notes, Issues or Additional Remarks:** Pursuant to EO 117 issued March 14, 2020, all persons are urged to maintain social distancing (approximately six feet away from other people) whenever possible and to continue to wash hands, utilize hand sanitizer and practice proper respiratory etiquette (including coughing into elbow).

CDC recommends wearing cloth face coverings in public settings where other social distancing measures are difficult to maintain (e.g., grocery stores and pharmacies) **especially** in areas of significant community-based transmission.
