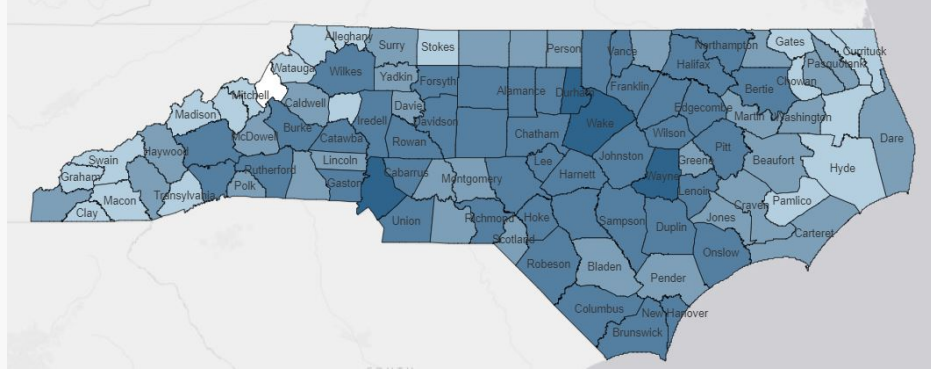
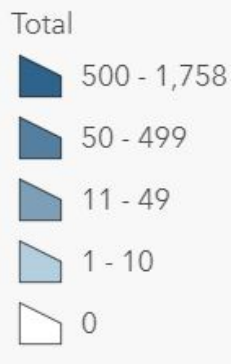




**Pender County Situation Report #55 - COVID-19 Event**  
**May 5, 2020 - The County is operating at EOC Status Level 3.**

<p><b>7. Current Situation: EOC IS OPERATING AT A LEVEL 3 STATUS.</b> Level 3 is a hazard specific response to an incident. This incident requires the assistance of several State agencies. The Emergency Operations Center is activated but only staffed with essential personnel. The EOC is not operating on 24-hour shifts. The EOC is only functioning during standard business hours, with minimal weekend staffing.</p> <p><b>Weather:</b> Today: <span style="background-color: yellow;">Partly sunny, with a high near 76. East wind around 8 mph, with gusts as high as 16 mph.</span>          Tonight: <span style="background-color: yellow;">A chance of showers and thunderstorms, mainly after midnight. Mostly cloudy, with a low around 61. East wind around 6 mph becoming light and variable. Chance of precipitation is 30%. New rainfall amounts of less than a tenth of an inch, except higher amounts possible in thunderstorms.</span>          Tomorrow: <span style="background-color: yellow;">A chance of showers and thunderstorms before 9am, then a slight chance of showers after 11am. Cloudy, then gradually becoming mostly sunny, with a high near 75. Northwest wind 7 to 10 mph, with gusts as high as 18 mph. Chance of precipitation is 30%. New precipitation amounts of less than a tenth of an inch, except higher amounts possible in thunderstorms.</span>  <span style="background-color: yellow;"><b>Minor coastal flooding could develop at the beaches during high tides Wednesday through Friday nights.</b></span></p> <p><b>Fire Weather:</b> <span style="background-color: yellow;">RP-1: Early morning showers and isolated thunderstorms will move off the Southeast NC Coast by late this morning, leaving debris cloudiness and occasional sunshine especially south of the developing warm front that will extend west and inland from Cape Fear NC. The next round of showers and thunderstorms will occur tonight as low pressure develops across the western Carolinas tonight and moves off the coast Wednesday. The front will push off the coast and offshore by Wednesday morning. The next cold front will move through late Friday, followed by unseasonably chilly weather as Canadian high pressure builds in for the weekend. Wind profile analysis/fire control over flat terrain is Favorable. **9. Incident Area:** As of today (5/5), the Pender County Health Department is aware of **nineteen (19)** Pender County residents who have tested positive for COVID-19. Of the positive cases, **six (6)** are offenders at Pender Correctional, **twelve (12)** are in the community, and one (1) is out of state. Ten (10) of the individuals who tested positive have recovered, while one (1) is deceased.

The Pender County Health Department is aware of **two hundred and fourteen (214)** residents of Pender County tested for COVID-19 by healthcare providers within the county. Of those tests, **eleven (11)** were confirmed positive, **two hundred (200)** were confirmed negative, while three (3) tests are currently pending. There have been **eight (8)** additional confirmed positive tests of Pender County residents performed by healthcare providers outside the county.

To respect patient privacy and comply with federal law, more specific information about these cases is not available. Every surrounding county has confirmed cases of COVID-19, so all Pender County residents should assume they are capable of getting or spreading the virus and take recommended precautions accordingly.

**10. External Affairs:** Pender County remains in monitoring mode. The Public Information Officer and the communications team are monitoring the County’s social media platforms and updating the County’s website with accurate information.

**11. County Action:**

- Pender County School System is feeding students and anyone 18 or younger at 56 sites, details [available here](#).
- Pender County Schools is providing wi-fi hotspots for school-issued devices from 7 AM to 7 PM seven days a week at Pender High, Topsail High, Heide Trask High, West Pender Middle, and Penderlea School. There is also a public wi-fi access point in the parking lot of the Pender County Public Library in Burgaw.
- Pender County Government is strongly encouraging appointments for in-person visits, information [available here](#). In accordance with the governor’s order that teleworking be practiced to the maximum extent possible, many staff members began teleworking starting Tuesday, March 31.
- Pender County Board of Commissioners Chairman George Brown declared a State of Emergency effective Monday, March 30, 2020.

**12. Other Notes, Issues or Additional Remarks:** Pursuant to EO 117 issued March 14, 2020, all persons are urged to maintain social distancing (approximately six feet away from other people) whenever possible and to continue to wash hands, utilize hand sanitizer and practice proper respiratory etiquette (including coughing into elbow).

CDC recommends wearing cloth face coverings in public settings where other social distancing measures are difficult to maintain (e.g., grocery stores and pharmacies) **especially** in areas of significant community-based transmission.
