7. Current Situation: EOC IS OPERATING AT A LEVEL 4 STATUS. Level 4 involves any disaster or emergency situation that is likely to be within the capabilities of local government and results in only minimal need for state assistance. The Emergency Operations Center is activated with staff as needed. State agency contacts that are involved in standard operations for Pender County are notified of the event and prepared to provide assistance.

Weather: Today: Mostly sunny, with a high near 80. Northeast wind around 11 mph, with gusts as high as 17 mph.

Tonight: Mostly clear, with a low around 55. Northeast wind 3 to 6 mph.

Tomorrow: Sunny, with a high near 79. Northeast wind 6 to 9 mph, with gusts as high as 16 mph.

There is a Beach Hazards Statement for Strong Longshore Current and a moderate risk of rip currents through this evening.


Fire Weather: RP-1: A cold front has moved off the coast this morning. In it's wake, a brief NE surge within 2000 feet of the surface will occur. High pressure over the Great Lakes will dominate and build southward into the Carolinas this afternoon through Mon. During Tue, it will slide off the coast and offshore. Mainly dry weather is expected thru the early to mid-week period. Warmer and more humid conditions are expected late this week with scattered showers and storms possible. Wind profile analysis/fire control over flat terrain is Unfavorable Type 1-F...Direction NE...Maximum Wind 34 mph at 1700 ft. Favorable Wind Profile will resume by early afternoon. Fog potential for tonight is Low.

GOVERNOR COOPER EXECUTIVE ORDERS (EOs)

- EOs 117, 118, 119, 120, 121, 122, 124, 125, 129, 130, 131, 133, 134, 135, 136, 138, 139, and 140 remain in effect except as superseded by subsequent orders. [Details here.](#)
- **EO 141 (May 20, 2020):** Eased restrictions on travel, business operations, and mass gatherings (“Phase 2”) beginning May 22, 202 at 5:00 PM.
- **EO 142 (May 30, 2020):** Placed temporary prohibitions on evictions and extended the prohibition on utility shut-offs.

9. Incident Area: As of today (5/31), the Pender County Health Department is aware of a total of eighty (80) Pender County residents who have tested positive for COVID-19. Of the positive cases, nineteen (19) are offenders at Pender Correctional and sixty-one (61) are in the community. Fifty-three (53) of the individuals who tested positive have recovered, while one (1) is deceased.

The Pender County Health Department is aware of six hundred and forty-three (643) people tested for COVID-19 by healthcare providers within the county.

NC DHHS is now providing a map of COVID-19 cases by ZIP code, [available here](#). To respect patient privacy and comply with federal law, more specific information about these cases is not available. Every surrounding county has confirmed cases of COVID-19, so all Pender County residents should assume they are capable of getting or spreading the virus and take recommended precautions accordingly.

10. External Affairs: Pender County remains in monitoring mode. The Public Information Officer and the communications team are monitoring the County’s social media platforms and updating the County’s website with accurate information.

11. County Action:

- Pender County School System is feeding students and anyone 18 or younger at 56 sites, details [available here](#).
- Pender County Schools is providing wi-fi hotspots for school-issued devices from 7 AM to 7 PM seven days a week at Pender High, Topsail High, Heide Trask High, West Pender Middle, and Penderlea School. There is also a public wi-fi access point in the parking lot of the Pender County Public Library in Burgaw.
- Pender County Government is strongly encouraging appointments for in-person visits, information [available here](#). In accordance with the governor’s order that teleworking be practiced to the maximum extent possible, many staff members began teleworking starting Tuesday, March 31. All teleworking staff without special accommodations should report back to work by Monday, June 1st. While walk-ins are permitted at this time, the public is encouraged to call or make an appointment to access county services.
- Pender County Board of Commissioners Chairman George Brown declared a State of Emergency effective Monday, March 30, 2020.

12. Other Notes, Issues or Additional Remarks: Pursuant to EO 117 issued March 14, 2020, all persons are urged to maintain social distancing (approximately six feet away from other people) whenever possible and to continue to wash hands, utilize hand sanitizer and practice proper respiratory etiquette (including coughing into elbow).

CDC recommends wearing cloth face coverings in public settings where other social distancing measures are difficult to maintain (e.g., grocery stores and pharmacies) **especially** in areas of significant community-based transmission.
